**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

**1. Introduction**

The City of Auburn (City) receives Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as an entitlement grant, and in turn, allocates funds for projects designed to achieve the goals and outcomes included in the Consolidated Plan. The CDBG provides a wide range of eligible community development and housing projects that benefit low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons.

According to HUD, the primary objective of the entitlement funds are to increase the availability, accessibility, affordability, and sustainability of 1) decent housing, 2) suitable living environments, and 3) expanding economic opportunities, principally for LMI persons. The CDBG regulations require that each activity meet one of the following national objectives: Benefit low- and moderate-income persons; Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight; and other community development needs having a particular urgency posing a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community.

In addition to the CDBG annual allocations, the March 27, 2020 passage of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136, provides \$5 billion in CDBG funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). The City, as an entitlement community, received \$379,956 in CDBG-Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funds from HUD. CDBG-CV funds may be used to assist in the City's response to the Coronavirus pandemic's effects, such as Public Service's needs, including the provision of post-COVID-19 recovery assistance to LMI residents.

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 created the CDBG Program, whose goals are to provide decent, safe, and sanitary housing; a suitable living environment; and to expand economic opportunity. Projects funded by the City with CDBG-CV funds meet the goal of providing a suitable living environment, including:

- Providing supportive services that directly relate to the prevention of homelessness to eligible individuals and families who are in danger of eviction, foreclosure, or homelessness or are currently homeless.
- Improving the quality of life for LMI persons through youth and childcare programs; supportive services for populations with special needs (e.g., seniors, persons with disabilities); and foodbanks/pantry programs.

Grantees are required to expend at least seventy (70%) of CDBG funds on activities that meet the national objective of benefiting LMI persons. The projects proposed for funding with CDBG-CV funds are one hundred percent (100%) intended to meet the needs of LMI persons.

As identified in Section NA-10 “Housing Needs Assessment” of the five-year Consolidated Plan, one challenge facing the City is cost-burdened households.

Goal indicator Outcome(s) for each goal are identified in Section SP-45 “Goals Summary” of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and Section AP-20 Annual “Goals and Objectives” of the 2019 Annual Action Plan.

The City's Citizen Participation Plan allows citizens to provide input on any substantial amendment to the Consolidated and Annual Action Plan and the amendment to the Citizen Participation Plan.

Per the Citizen Participation Plan, the City issued the following notice and conduct hearings to allow citizens to comment on proposed substantial amendments to the City's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Annual Action Plan and an amendment to its 2015-2019 Citizen Participation Plan.

The City published a public notice in *The Auburn Villager* on June 11, 2020:

## AP-35 Projects - 91.220(d)

The City will use CDBG-CV funds for eligible activities that serve LMI persons and or urgent needs. These activities must either be new or an expansion of current activities. They cannot substitute existing activities or replace other funding for existing activities or services.

The City has identified the following type of projects for CVBG-CV funding.

Public Services – Homelessness Prevention. Individuals or families facing the possibility of eviction or utility disconnection make them particularly vulnerable to homelessness and susceptible to illness during the COVID-19 pandemic. CDBG-CV funds will support cost-burdened and severely cost burden LMI citizens and combat the risk of eviction and homelessness by providing temporary emergency assistance and emergency assistance grants (Utility and Rent/Mortgage) made over a period of up to three consecutive months to the provider of such items or services on behalf of an individual or family. To avoid duplication of benefits, the City will enter all applicants' names for emergency grant payments in Charity Tracker. Other local agencies and non-profits use Charity Tracker when offering emergency grant payments (primarily utility assistance) to LMI persons.

Public Services – Youth Supportive Services. Childcare and youth programs are expensive to operate and provide. Many agencies that offer these services have continued to provide significant support to youth and families, including facilitating provisions of educational enrichment materials and meals. CDBG-CV funds will support the work of local non-profits that provide critical youth supportive services to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. CDBG-CV funds will support the work of local non-profits that provide essential youth supportive services in response to COVID-19.

Public Services – Senior Supportive Services. Public health officials identified senior citizens as an at-risk population related to COVID-19 -- those over 60 years of age and those whose immune systems are compromised. The “Stay-at-home” directive significantly affects senior citizens who rely on public services and senior centers for essentials like daily meals and social interaction. CDBG-CV funds will also support senior supportive services in response to COVID-19, including enrichment activities for seniors that they can enjoy at home during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Public Services – Food Bank/Pantry Programs. Food banks act as food storage and distribution depots for member agencies. They distribute food and grocery items through food pantries, mobile pantries, and meal programs that serve families, children, seniors, and individuals at risk of hunger. Food banks across the nation are under widespread and growing pressure as they cope with an increase in the number of hungry Americans amid the COVID-19 pandemic – and the dramatic decline in donations and dwindling volunteers. CDBG-CV funds will support the local food bank/pantries who are scrambling to keep up with demand in response to COVID-19.
